





COMMUNITY EFFORTS Develop PEER SUPPORT GROUPS

- Encourage local businesses and organizations to POOL RESOURCES TO HELP KINSHIP FAMILIES Offer to PROVIDE OCCASIONAL CHILD CARE FOR KINSHIP CAREGIVERS when they need a break
- LIFT THE MORATORIUM on the Kentucky Kinship Care Program so that more kinship caregivers can get the financial support they need to raise children

Advocate for INCREASED SUPPORTS FOR KINSHIP FAMILIES

POLICY RECOMMENDATIONS

- Increase supports for children being raised in kinship care to MATCH THE LEVEL OF SUPPORTS
