

Research to Transform the Child Welfare System

Kentucky Youth Advocates has undertaken one of our largest research endeavors yet a comprehensive review of Kentucky's child welfare system. KYA has analyzed data and spoken with hundreds of Kentuckians, including social workers, judges, attorneys, foster parents, birth parents, young people who grew up in the child welfare system, and state leaders so that we can **develop recommendations** on how the system can keep kids safe and connected to a family.

National and local organizations, such as the Annie E. Casey Foundation, Casey Family Programs, and Kosair Charities®, have supported KYA's work in the child welfare system for many years. And now, with the generous support of a private donor, we can serve as a megaphone for the Kentucky kids and families who face some of the biggest barriers to a bright future. We look forward to sharing the findings and recommendations from this research soon.

Senate Bill 236 helps keep kids safe from abuse by closing gaps in background checks for public schools, youth camps, and in-home babysitters.



Senate Bill 195 helps kids who get back on track more easily expunge their records and 195 not be held back from a brighter future.

Senate Bill 120 helps parents leaving incarceration more easily get back to work and start supporting their families.

House Bill 180 allows close family friends to serve as kinship caregivers when kids are removed from their homes due to abuse or neglect.
