Federal funding for Kentucky impacted by U.S. Census data



Program	Purpose	Amount
Health	- Maternal and child health programs to promote healthy pregnancies and strong starts in life - Children's Health Insurance Program (CHIP)	\$11.4 million in FY 2023 \$400 Million in FFY 2024
Child Safety & Well-being	- Federal Foster Care Program - Adoption Assistance Program	\$38.5 million in FFY 2024 \$89 million in FFY 2024
Early Childhood & Education	- Child care subsidies to support working parents - Head Start and Early Head Start programs	\$186.8 million in Grant Year 2023 \$200.8 million in FFY 2023
Education	- Title I to support students from families with limited income to succeed in school - National School Lunch Program, which provides low-cost and free meals to students at school	\$281.3 million in FFY 2024 \$535.5 million in FFY 2024
Nutrition	Women, Infants, and Children (WIC) providing nutrition and other support	\$79 million in FFY 2024

Health

In FFY 2023, **132,000** children in Kentucky had health insurance through CHIP.

Early Childhood & Education

In state fiscal year 2024, **51,350** children received child care subsidies.

Nutrition

During 2023, **89,421** Kentucky infants and children received WIC.

Education

During FFY 2022, Kentucky funding for Head Start & Early Head Start:

- Covered 18,289 slots - 15,186 Head Start and 3,103 Early Head Start
- Provided 1,116 Head Start Classrooms
- Funded 391 Head Start Centers that also connect children and families to services such as healthcare, dental care, and homeless services
- Made the programs available to 36% of Kentucky 3 to 5-year-olds (Head Start) and 16% of children under age 3 (Early Head Start)

During FFY 2023, the National School Lunch program in Kentucky served:

Students: **486,970**
Meals Served: **76,329,625**

During FFY 2023, the Summer Food Service program in Kentucky served **5.3 million meals.**
